If you chaired a session, thanks for making the process run smoothly across the 3 days of the conference. Ausmed then backed up and sponsored the conference dinner, where those in attendance enjoyed the food variety, the company and the photographic challenge on the night of the 19th June. The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander work in relation to the graduate Nursing and Midwifery space, one of our presenters, Amanda Naumann, from Sunshine Coast Health (Queensland), has been listed as one of the finalists for a 2025 APAC Asia Pacific Learning Impact Award, in the category "Diversity & Inclusion Learning Initiative". The Sunshine Coast Health Team will know how they fared on the 4th September 2025, Good Luck to Amanda and the Nursing & Midwifery Practice Development Team at Sunshine Coast Health.

Our 49th Annual General Meeting was conducted during the conference on the 19th June 2025. We will meet on the 13th August to finalise the office bearer roles for the upcoming year. To our outgoing office bearers, we appreciate your volunteerism and your time in making it to our monthly meetings.

On Friday 23rd May 2025, I had the honour of representing ANTS at the biennial meeting of CoNNMO, along with 45 other representatives of peak nursing and midwifery bodies from across Australia. Adjunct Professor (Practice) Alison McMillan provided an overview of what is happening at the office of the Commonwealth Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officer; Natalie Bekis, Assistant Secretary provided an informative review of what is happening in relation to the nursing and midwifery professions within the Commonwealth Department of Health Disability and Ageing. Alessandra Peck, CEO provided an update on behalf of the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia. Similarly, Tanya Vogt, CEO informed those present of the activities of the Australian Nursing and Midwifery Accreditation Council. Member organisations 6-monthly reports were tabled and selected member organisations then got to showcase some of their recent activities. These included: Mitch Wall, Australian Primary Health Care Nurses

Association presenting Florence by APNA – a new Continuing Professional Development tool, recently released by APNA. Karen Booth, Chief Clinical Advisor (Nursing) provided an informative update on the activities of the Australian Digital Health Agency. On a similar vein, Jen Bichel Findlay representing the Nursing Midwifery in Digital Health Network spoke about the use of Artificial Intelligence in Digital Health. Lastly, Annie Butler, Federal Secretary Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation provided a recap to CoNNMO members on the recent and current activities of the ANMF.

Vale Aunty Dr Sally Goold (nee Bamblett) – I would like to acknowledge the recent passing of the Elder and Founding Director of the Congress of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Nurses (CATSIN) [1997], now the Congress of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Nurses and Midwives (CATSINaM), Aunty Dr Sally Goold, OAM. Aunty Sally, a proud Wiradjuri woman was recognised as the first Aboriginal nurse in New South Wales, commencing her studies at the Royal Prince Alfred Hospital at the age of 16. In 1971, Dr Goold was approached by Torres Strait Islander nurse Dulcie Flower AM to help set up and run the Redfern Aboriginal Medical Service, which was the first Aboriginal community-controlled health organisation.

In her lifetime she forged an extraordinary trail for those that follow in her footsteps, overwhelmingly shaping nursing and midwifery education, policy, and service delivery at a national level. Whilst lecturing at the Queensland University of Technology she organised community visits for students to increase their awareness of cultural issues, safety and respect. In 2007, Aunty Dr Sally Goold became part of the inaugural National Indigenous Council for the Australian Government. Aunty Dr Sally Goold was an inaugural Director of the Australian Nursing & Midwifery Council Accreditation Board (ANMAC), serving between 2010 to 2012. Her influence on culturally safe, inclusive healthcare education remains a cornerstone of ANMAC's evolution. In their In Memoriam statement ANMAC states "Sally didn't just open doors - she walked through them holding others' hands".



Aunty Dr Sally Goold was awarded a Medal of the Order of Australia in 1986 for her unstinting services to nursing education and Aboriginal health. In 2002, Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology (RMIT) awarded her an Honorary Doctorate in Nursing, and later the National Australia Day Council named her Senior Australian of the Year, in 2006. ANTS would like to acknowledge Aunty Dr Sally Goold OAM for her excellence as a clinician, educator, administrator and for helping to shape culturally safe healthcare

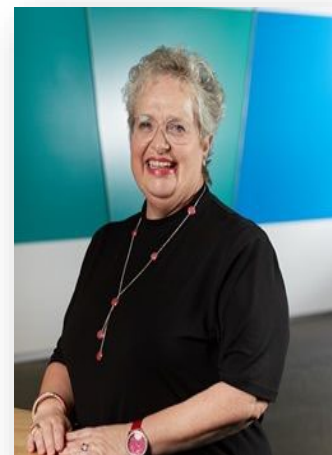

The effectiveness of organisational support and workplace practices after clinical incidents

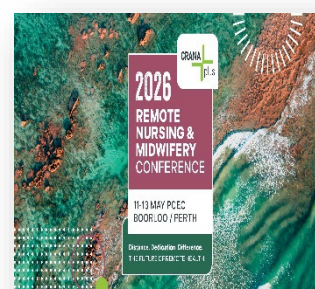

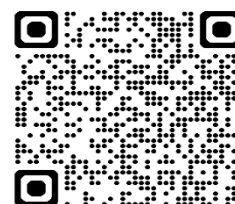

Hi all, my name is Maddison Stead, please feel free to call me Maddi. I am a new member to the ANTS and new contributor to the bulletin. At our last conference Amanda and I were talking about how we care for ourselves at work. We came up with an idea to add a section into the bulletin where we can discuss health and wellbeing through articles and members contributions.

The demands of academic and clinical teaching, lesson planning, and importantly, mentoring can take a toll—both physically and mentally. As academics, nursing and midwifery educators, our well-being is essential to supporting the learning and growth of others. That's why we believe it is important to care for ourselves before we can care for others. During my nursing career it has been challenging to learn how to make sure I am the best me and the best nurse. Often I thought that someone would teach me how to cope or that someone would fix everything. Growing in my career allowed me to learn that "Resilience is knowing you are the only one that has the power and the responsibility to pick yourself up" (Mary Holloway). But that doesn't mean we can't share and learn from each other.

I am currently reading 'Burnout- Solve your stress cycle' by Emily and Amelia Nagoski. I was initially drawn to this book after seeing a review from Brene Brown and realised I was a few years late to the party. One of my goals this year is to become more informed about how I cycle through stress at work. To be able to recognise the environment around me and how it affects me before I realise I am overwhelmed. As I reflect on conversations with my colleagues some feel they are expected to know how to manage stress and wellbeing but it is important to recognise that many of our colleagues may not know where to start or how to implement what they learn from others.
